### 2 Timothy 4:6-8

• What are your expectations for gospel ministry and perhaps especially church planting?

#### Structure

- In (6) Paul looks around and describes his present experience of ministry
- In (7) he looks back and surveys his previous ministry
- In (8) he looks forward anticipates his future reward

And so, what Paul provides us with here is three perspectives on his own ministry experience to fuel Timothy's.

# 1. Paul's model ministry experience was sacrificial (6)

**6** For I am already being poured out like a drink offering, and the time for my departure is near.

These are two perspectives then of what ministry life looked like for him.

First, he's being poured out like a drink offering.

Secondly, 'the time for my departure is near'.

### 2. Paul's model ministry experience was completed (7)

Paul's assessment of his own ministry experience was summarised in three metaphors that all regard a task as being completed.

7 I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith.

- He had fought the good fight.
- He had finished the race.
- He had kept the faith.

- In 1:8 he writes, 'So do not be ashamed of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner. Rather, join with me in suffering for the gospel, by the power of God'.
- In 2:3 he writes, 'Join with me in suffering, like a good soldier of Christ Jesus'.
- In 4:5 he writes, 'But you, keep your head in all situations, endure hardship, do the work of an evangelist, discharge all the duties of your ministry'.

## 3. Paul's model ministry experience was expectant (8)

**8** Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day – and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for his appearing.

#### Conclusion

What is your ministry experience going to be like?

What's that going to feel like?

- Because it's pouring ourselves out in sacrifice, it's going to hurt.
- Because it's about completing a task that's been set before us, it's about doing the hard yards.
- Because it's about expecting a future reward, it's hopeful.
