
Place: Cultural Exegesis: Part 2

Ted Turnau's Worldview Tree¹

"Worldviews are rooted in assumptions about reality (presuppositions); and from these assumptions flows a story that tries to make sense of our lives and reality (world-story); and out of this world-story flows a specific life-philosophy system (even if it is only a rudimentary street philosophy); and from this life-philosophy flows our applied beliefs about all sorts of things; and from these beliefs we live and act. Worldviews are organic, complex roots-to-fruits systems." Turnau, 14-15.

Ted Turnau's 5 Questions to engage with cultural artefacts/ideas²

- 1. What's the story?
- 2. Where am I? What is the world of this story? What are the rules in this world?
- 3. What is good and true and beautiful in this world?
- 4. What is false and ugly and perverse in this world?
- 5. How does the Gospel apply here?

Therefore.... a sixth question....

6. How does this help shape our church plant plans and culture?

Avoiding Ethnocentricism

Ethno-centricity = judging another culture by your own culture

Duncan Forbes³

- 1. Different cultures see the same things in different ways
- 2. Different cultures have different perspectives on basic values of life
- 3. Different cultures have different worldviews.

What's the danger?

- We approve or disapprove of others actions based on our own cultural bias
- We mistake cultural issues as sin issues
- We bring sinful elements of our own culture into the church
- We think someone has been converted to Christ when they have just been converted to our culture
- We think someone hasn't been converted to Christ if they haven't been converted to our culture
- We miss what God is actually doing in people lives
- A confused and divided church

1.	Self-Critique - Critique your own culture first (and continually)
2.	Enter: Appreciate and Empathise - how do they reflect God better? What hear issues do we share?
3.	Engage: Confront and appeal - How might the gospel challenge this culture? How might the gospel bring hope in this culture?
